A Word from Father...

Dear Friends:

Laudate si! Praise be to you, Lord! Pope Francis has borrowed those lovely words of praise from Saint Francis of Assisi, the great saint of creation and nature to begin his most recent encyclical letter to the Church and to the world. They singularly appropriate words to open his heartfelt call to Catholics and all humanity to take to heart the need for all of us to adapt our lifestyles and, by extension, our economies and social systems, to protect the earth that has been given to us as a gift from God.



I am just now reading the encyclical, and I must say, it is a touching and beautiful work, and unlike some commentators and politicians have suggested, it is singularly appropriate that he, as a religious and spiritual leader, speak out on the issue of care for our environment. What could be more “moral,” “religious,” and “spiritual” than calling humanity away from a relationship to this gift of creation that is abusive rather than protective and nurturing? As with our other relationships in life, those with our family members, neighbors, and co-workers, our relationship to the earth is one that demands respect and care. The consequences of treating our earth without respect, as if it were not a gift from God, will be horrific for our children and children’s children.

Pope Francis’ encyclical is worth reading for yourselves. Let him inspire you to new care, new respect, and indeed, new love for God’s great gift of the earth to us. It is available widely on the internet for downloading or it can soon be purchased in printed form from Kaufer’s or Amazon.

May all of us join Pope Francis and Saint Francis in praising God and his creation, not only in words, but in deeds: *Laudate si!*

RETURN TO SACRED HEART

Rev. Thien Doan with his wife, Kerry, were in Spokane the week of July 13-17 and visited Sacred Heart. Thien’s family had been sponsored by Sacred Heart through Catholic Charities’ Vietnamese refugee resettlement program in 1975. Sponsor parishes provided housing and other essential needs as refugees rebuilt their lives. Thien’s family lived in a house on East 9th Ave. While many refugees in Spokane adjusted to American culture and economy, not everyone coped with climate change! Thien’s family eventually relocated to California. While the weather may have been a problem for the adults, Thien has the happy memory of his brothers sledding down a snow covered hill near the church! He now lives in Orange County where he is an Evangelical pastor, whose mission is “church planting” (cf 1 Cor 3,6).
