

A Word from Father...



Dear Friends,

We begin something always ancient and ever new today: Advent is upon us once again! This most gentle and lovely of church seasons fairly hums with hope and lifts our drooping heads to a not-so-distant horizon where humanity meets divinity.

The unbroken circle of the wreath represents for us the unbroken thread of life that begins here on this earth but continues through death into the great Eternity of God. The evergreens woven into that circle speak of life, too, at first fresh and aromatic, but by the end of the season, drying and dying. They remind us that life is a gift and even when fading, the love in that gift endures and lives and guides us back to the Grace from which we first came.

The flickering small flames above each of the four candles, first one, then two, then three and four, they proclaim that even in the falling darkness of winter, and that, too, of evil, the Light, fragile and bowing to whatever breeze there might come, conquers, not through battle, but by diffusion, its lightness seeping out into the darkness itself and making it dissolve into the Light beyond all light.

The threefold violet of penance is balanced by the single streak of rose-hewed joy. Penance, indeed, for we are so broken and so forgetful of the Creator and so cold to our neighbor, but joy, too, for the Light from Light that soon comes with stockings full of mercy and gift-wrapped packages bursting with compassion and forgiveness and New Life.

The days of Advent tick by, marked by little doors on cardboard calendars, some holding within small chocolates and others scriptures. Time passes, the days, the weeks, the years, the life-spans. We wait, we are anxious, we hope: Flesh slipping away, but the Word becoming Flesh and carrying the heart of that flesh beyond the grave and into forever Easter.

For us in the North, snow will come our way as well. Advent Snow. A winter Mana from heaven. Grace upon grace falling upon the shoulders of each of us and all of us, the good and the bad, the saint and the sinner. Catch a flake of Advent on your tongue and that single fragile melting flake will bring you delight beyond delights: such is God. Lay down in the snow and spread your arms and legs to make a snow angel, an Advent Angel, announcing to Mary to you and to all of us: "His name shall be Jesus, Emmanuel, God-with-us!"

Ahh! Advent! Let it unfold among us like a flower well-petalled with repentance, aroma-rich with hope, and bursting open in pinwheels of Grace!
