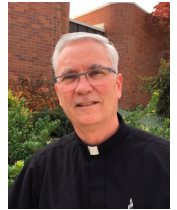


Blue Envelope Fund

A Word from Father...



Dear Friends,

During this Lenten season, as we did last year, our choirs have been using a bit of Latin for the “*Holy, Holy, Holy*” (“*Sanctus*”) and the “*Lamb of God*,” (“*Agnus Dei*”), and even a bit of Greek in the “*Lord, have mercy*” (“*Kyrie eleison*”) of the Penitential Rite at our Sunday liturgies.

A few parishioners have offered us words of commendation for the practice, noting the lovely Gregorian melodies especially, even as a few others have wondered why we have “gone back to the Latin” after more than fifty years of our Catholic Mass being celebrated in the vernacular.

Well, Lent is close to winding up for another year and the Holy Week and Easter liturgies will be swinging into high gear shortly, but I hope it is not too late to write a few words about just why we have marked the Lenten season’s liturgies in this way.

Let me begin by noting that a culturally well-rounded person nurtures appreciation for a variety of musical and literary styles, even those from other times and cultures. For example, though I still really like a lot of pop/rock music from my youth, I also have come to love medieval music (surprisingly refreshing and sometimes quite earthy!), the Romantic symphonies of Beethoven, and even now after the musical, *Hamilton*, I can at least have some appreciation for the poetic genius in rap and hip hop.

Much the same is true for the music and poetry we use in our Catholic liturgy. Our treasure chest of styles is as deep as our 2000 year old history as a church family. Because of that richness we can sing in the course of a single Sunday liturgy a contemporary American hymn, an African-American spiritual, a British hymn from the 19th Century, Gregorian chant, and even medieval polyphony. All of it belongs to us; all of it is part of our spiritual heritage. Any one style from any age can express in word and melody the deepest mysteries of our faith. The Greek *Kyrie eleison* chanted to a simple Gregorian tone can capture the penitential spirit of the faithful in Lent as much as the English version of the contemporary Mass of Glory capture that of Easter. Additionally, the Greek or Latin versions have the power to express our communion with Catholics of all nations and every age who sing or have sung the very same words in so many places and across the centuries. This even as the English versions have the power to express in our own idiom and culture our deepest spiritual sentiments. Our store room of prayer is rich and deep and full; accessing that fullness is one of the riches of our Catholic tradition.

Why a bit of Greek here and a bit of Latin there during our Lenten liturgies? Lent is a season that needs to stand apart from the rest of the church year in its sobriety of tone and prepare the stage for the joyous liturgies of Easter to come. The *Kyrie eleison*, *Sanctus*, and *Agnus Dei* in their unadorned simplicity, express that sober spirit well. In a couple of weeks more, we’ll be deep into other styles appropriate for Easter and Pentecost...*hip hop anyone?*
