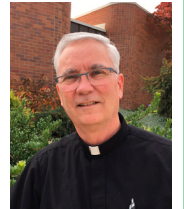

## *A Word from Father...*



Dear Friends,

Having entered into Graduation season, I am reminded of my own graduations and so allow me a brief trip down memory lane...

My most vivid memory of Eighth Grade Graduation is a mad mob of us graduates, having finished our Baccalaureate Mass and received our standard Catholic Elementary School degrees and report cards from Monsignor O'Connor, running through the halls of Saint Charles School singing over and over, “We gotta get outta this place...if it’s the last thing we ever do...;” our version of being 1960’s rock n roll revolutionaries. You see, our eighth grade teacher had not been the best and we mostly disliked her, and were more than happy to never have to sit through her rants about our status as no-gooders and probable delinquents ever again.

High school graduation was a little different story, but not too much. Rep. Thomas Foley was the main speaker and I don’t think we gave him the respect that was his due; I remember cans of soda (it couldn’t have been beer) being rolled up the G-Prep gym floor towards the Congressman’s podium making a weird rolling noise from under our folding chairs as he spoke. Our cheering was over the top when he finished. My aunt who was present commented dryly as we were departing, “Well, your class is certainly exuberant.” Indeed, we were. Still firmly in the grip of the youth revolution, respect for elders and the establishment wasn’t high on our list of virtues to be working on. Sadly, it is now way too late to apologize to Mr. Foley, but maybe, all in all, he found it humorous.

My graduation from Gonzaga University had none of the rebellious character of its predecessors; I remember little about it except that it took place in Kennedy Pavilion, now the Kennel; my mind was focused not so much on the previous four years of finding myself in Search retreats, *plein-air* philosophy classes on the quadrangle, speech and debate tournaments, and the ups and downs of community life at Bishop White Seminary; it was mostly preoccupied with the huge cloud of on the horizon of my life: travelling to Belgium to begin my theological studies in Louvain. Would I be up to the intellectual challenges of study in one of the great universities of Europe? Would I get homesick? What kind of friends might I find there? What would life be like *outside* Spokane and America? What if I hated it? As I left Spokane later that summer to fly away, I felt like I was leaving everything I had ever known, and in some ways, I was. No internet, terrible phone service, and letters that took two weeks just to go one way (a month before a response would come back) made that distance between home and new world immense. As with the other graduations in my life, that one was an open door to many new adventures, wonderful new blessings, new families to call my own, and it was a time of tremendous maturing in everything human and spiritual.

I pray for today’s graduates; may their diplomas also be open doors to new adventures in coming to know themselves, their world, and their God.

To our grads: I wish you wisdom and grace!
