

A Word from Father...



Dear Friends,

On this Fourth Sunday of the Easter season, the image of the Good Shepherd looms large. Today's Gospel reading from John (10:11-18) begins with Jesus speaking: "I am the good shepherd!" We are so used to hearing those words and hearing them in a kindly way that we miss the radical subversion that Jesus is working here, for in his time and culture, shepherds would never have been considered "good" in any reasonable sense of the word. Instead, shepherds were the down and dirty, the uneducated and smelly, the thieving and dangerous of his time. To call a shepherd "good" was incomprehensible in the imagination of his listeners. Even more, to call himself a shepherd must have left even his most devoted of followers scratching their heads (except for maybe the prostitutes and tax collectors!).

He goes on to explain his choice of this wild and woolly image for himself by pushing his listeners to attend not to the prejudiced and judgmental view of shepherds held by nearly everyone who had any dignity, culture, or standing in his society, but to what they *actually do!* A SHEPHERD LAYS DOWN HIS LIFE FOR HIS SHEEP!

They may be rascals and ruffians when they come into town on a Friday night, but isn't it amazing that these same shepherds when out in the field with their flock will fight any wolf to the death to save his sheep from depredation! This kind of self-sacrificial spirit, this self-giving love, is good, and even more, it is *godly!* Jesus goes on to say that this kind of love that the shepherd has for his sheep is just like his own love for his own "sheep", the lost and forgotten of Israel, the very ones who the Big Shots of Jerusalem, those chief priests and their minions, abandon without a thought. "Those you forget about and even despise, I die for."

Wow! Nobody in that 1st century crowd would have seen all of this coming! Jesus upends their religious world by subverting their self-important dignity as 'the good people... the godly people' of Israel. Nope. The "good people" of Israel are those who know how to die to self and die for others...just like those shepherds out there in the field protecting their sheep from marauding wolves. "I am *that* good shepherd!"

Alleluia!
